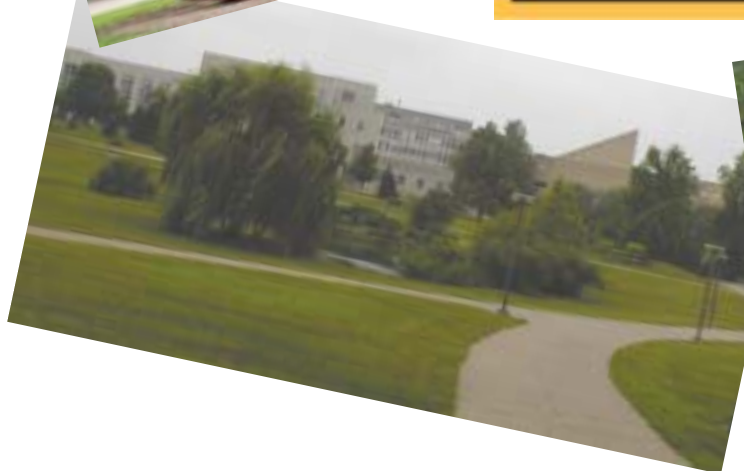
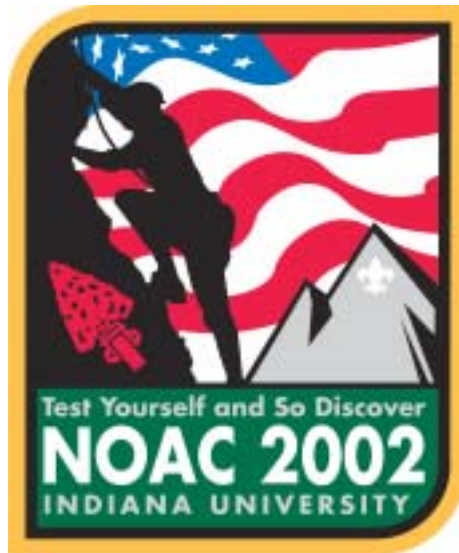

Handicap parking permits may be obtained at the security office, room 212, McNutt Hall.

Person must provide vehicle information make, model, color and state registration plus proof of valid handicap permit in home state.

Bicycles are permitted on campus. BSA rules require wearing of a helmet. Skate boards are not allowed.

There is a curfew in the state of Indiana for youth under the age of 18 unless accompanied by an adult coming from an activity. Curfews begin at 11p.m. on weekdays and 1a.m. to 5a.m. on weekends.

There is a no smoking rule that applies to all campus buildings. Smoke alarms in the buildings bring a full response by fire and rescue.

There are blue emergency lights located on campus. These are 911 enhanced and also bring a full response by emergency personnel. They are emergency only. It is a criminal violation to activate one in a non-emergency. The University Police will take action.

To call campus police emergency from cell phones dial direct to their dispatch center at 812-855-4111. Dialing 911 from cell phone will delay response.

Emergency operations: In event of a weather emergency a steady wail siren will sound. If you hear this alarm, seek shelter immediately. All campus buildings have designated shelter areas.

## NOAC Health Information

The Medical Staff would like to take this opportunity to welcome you to the 2002 National Order of the Arrow Conference. Our goal during the conference is to provide you with the best medical support possible. In order to do this, there are several important points of interest to discuss.

A walk-in clinic has been established for your use here at Indiana University during the conference. This is located in the Landes Wing Activity Suite of Read Hall. It will be open 24 hours a day throughout the conference, except during the two hours scheduled for

the shows each night, and will be staffed with physicians, nurses and EMTs. Please feel free to utilize the clinic if needed; there will be no charge for services at our clinic.

We will have a limited pharmacy and will be able to handle most minor medical problems without the need for you to visit the local Emergency Room or the Student Health Services on campus.

There will always be a physician on duty and you can contact the clinic at 856-9677. In addition, a first-aid station will be set up on Wednesday, during the hours of the Founders Day Celebration.

The location for this first-aid station will be in the field where Founders Day is scheduled to take place. In addition, you are welcome to utilize the University's Health Center; however, they will expect payment upon delivery of any services.

If you or the members of your contingent encounter an emergency or the need for immediate emergency assistance, do not attempt to locate a member of the medical staff. Find the nearest phone and dial 911. Once the patient has been stabilized, then notify the medical staff at 856-9677 as soon as possible.

If you have any special medical needs or you require the storage of refrigerated medications, please let us know at the clinic.

Again, welcome to the 2002 National Order of the Arrow Conference. We look forward to serving you during the conference and hope you have a safe and healthy visit here at Indiana University.

## Lodge Spirit Award

Twenty Lodges will be honored at this National Order of the Arrow Conference with the Lodge Spirit Award. The eight inch tall glass recognition piece engraved with the conference logo will be presented at 4:00 pm on Founder's Day, Wednesday, July 31, 2002.

Judging for this presentation begins with the registration process. Lodges registering their attendance quota plus 1.5% more were issued a special scorecard during the registration. Requirements, previously posted on the National Order of the Arrow website ([www.oa-bsa.org](http://www.oa-bsa.org)), are as follows:

Exceed your lodge quota requirements by at least 1.5%

Participate in the OA Museum display or host a Founder's Day booth

Participate in the Very Important Arrowman (VIA) luncheon

Compete in either a ceremonial competition or Native American Dance competition

Compete in an athletic competition

Compete in a non-athletic competition (chorus, band, newsletter, camp promo, website competition, etc.)

Attend the National Council of Chiefs (NCOG)

A high percentage of lodge attendees earn the Brotherhood Award.

Requirements 1-7 will be validated at the competition site by members of the Conference Staff via a pre-approved rubber stamp. Hand signed or initialed scorecards are not acceptable. Requirement 8 will be validated by the Special Events Committee at the committee table during Founders Day. Lodges are required to return their scorecards prior to 2:00 p.m. to the Special Events Committee. Part of the fun will be how your lodge manages its card and how it carries the card to all special activities for the week.

If your lodge is not competing for the Lodge Spirit Award at this conference, make your plans now to prepare and compete in 2004. Questions and/or concerns may be directed to the Special Events Office at 812-855-1148.

# Accept the Code of Conduct Challenge

The general welfare of any group depends on the conduct of each individual member. This ensures the success of our National Order of the Arrow Conference and provides the maximum benefit to every participant. As an Arrowman, I understand this and support the reasonable demands of conduct expected of me.

I understand the lodge contingent leadership is responsible for the supervision of its membership in respect to maintaining discipline and security, and TO ENFORCE the National Conference Code of Conduct.

As a member to the Order of the Arrow, I will:

1. Observe the Scout Oath or Promise, the Scout Law and the Order of the Arrow Obligation.
2. Wear my official uniform and official conference identification throughout the conference. Unofficial hats, patch jackets, medals, or decorations are not a part of my official uniform.
3. Attend all planned training and general sessions.
4. Confine trading and swapping to free periods and designated areas.

5. Be personally responsible for breakage, damage, or loss of property.
6. Observe quiet hours and lights out from midnight to 7 a.m.
7. Keep my quarters clean, my bed made and dispose of trash in proper place.
8. Not change my officially assigned room without permission from conference headquarters. The reason: emergency calls, for example, could not be delivered if room changes were unofficial.
9. Allow no unregistered person to occupy my dormitory room.
10. Wear suitable covering in the dormitory when going down the halls. I'll also wear suitable covering while swimming in the pool or

11. participating in any conference program. Observe all rules regarding the use of the swimming pools and other athletic facilities.
12. Understand that the purchase, possession, or

13. consumption of alcoholic beverages or illicit drugs at the conference will not be permitted and will result in the immediate dismissal from the conference. This standard shall apply to all youth and adult participants. Compliance with state law and university regulations will apply at all times.
14. Comply with federal, state and city laws and university regulations, including those which prohibit the use of fireworks, firearms, and gambling. Infraction of these laws and regulations will be cause for immediate dismissal from the conference.
15. Comply with the university rule prohibiting the use of private automobiles on campus without permission from conference headquarters.
16. Not be authorized to sell items at the conference. I understand that the official trading posts are the only source for purchasing items at the conference.
17. At all times, be the considerate guest of a considerate host university. Follow the Boy Scouts of America's policy on smoking and observe all university NO SMOKING restrictions.

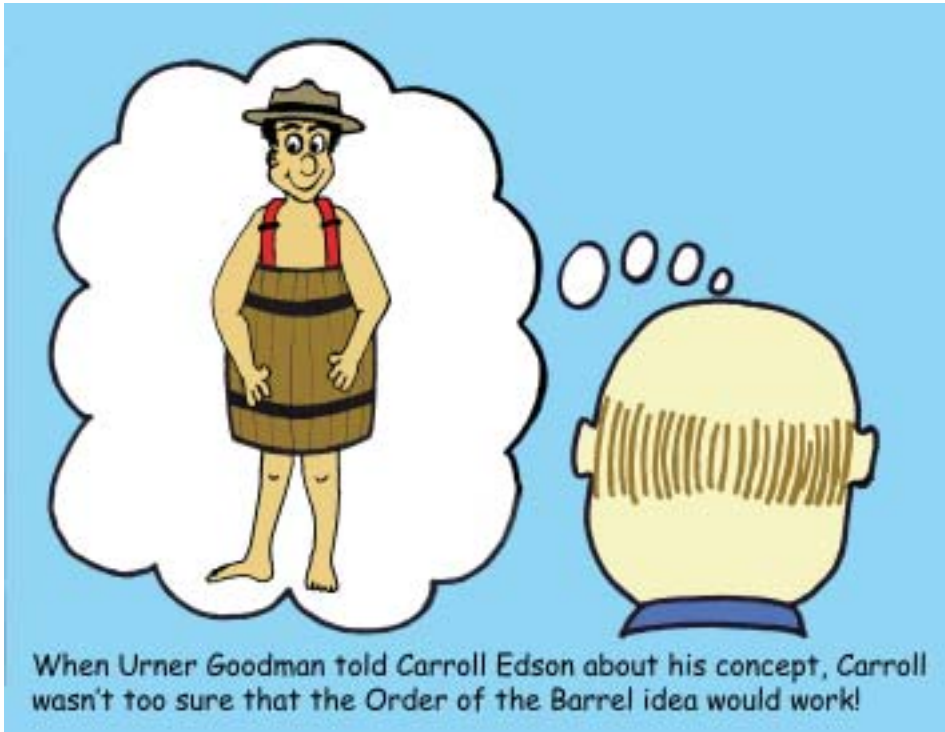
